

# 5 Day Devotional

## Day 1: Sight Is Not Enough

### Devotional

You can have perfect vision and still be completely lost. There is a difference between seeing what is in front of you and knowing where you are going. Helen Keller could not see or hear, yet she graduated college, wrote fourteen books, and spent her life fighting for others. She had something many people with full sight never find: a clear picture of the future she was called toward.

Paul writes in 2 Corinthians 3:11 that what remains is glorious. The new covenant, the life you have been invited into through Jesus Christ, is not a small thing. It is not a routine. It is not just waking up, going through the motions, and starting over tomorrow. It is a life with direction, purpose, and meaning.

If every day feels like the one before it, that is worth paying attention to. God did not save you so you could survive. He saved you so you could live with intention. He has placed something inside of you that is bigger than your current circumstances, bigger than your past, and bigger than what you can see right now.

You were not made for an ordinary life. You were made for a life that requires faith. And that starts with being honest about whether you are truly living with vision or simply going through the motions. Today is a good day to ask God to open your eyes to what He has already placed in front of you.

### Bible Verse

"For if what is passing away was glorious, what remains is much more glorious." - 2 Corinthians 3:11 (New King James Version (NKJV))

### Reflection Question

If someone watched how you spent your time and energy this past week, would they be able to identify a clear sense of God-given purpose driving your life?

### Quote

"If you don't have a vision, every day becomes like the previous day."

### Prayer

Lord, open my eyes to the vision You have placed inside of me. Help me to stop settling for routine when You have called me to something greater. Amen.

## Day 2: The Veil That Blocks Your View

### Devotional

There is a reason some people can know about God and still feel like He is far away. Paul describes it as a veil. In 2 Corinthians 3:14, he explains that the minds of many were hardened, and that same veil remains unlifted because it is only removed in Christ.

A veil does not have to be dramatic to be effective. It can be the noise of too much social media. It can be relationships that pull you away from God rather than toward Him. It can be a heart that is too busy, too distracted, or too comfortable to truly seek Him. The veil is anything that keeps you from seeing clearly what God is doing and where He is leading.

Here is the encouraging truth: the veil is not permanent. It is not stronger than God. The moment you genuinely turn to the Lord, it is removed. Not reduced. Not thinned out. Removed.

God wants you to see clearly. He wants you to experience Him, not just know facts about Him. There is a difference between knowing God and experiencing His power in your daily life. He is not hiding from you. He is waiting for you to turn fully toward Him so He can show you what He has already prepared.

Today, take an honest look at what might be blocking your view. Then turn toward the One who can take it away completely.

### Bible Verse

"But their minds were blinded. For until this day the same veil remains unlifted in the reading of the Old Testament, because the veil is taken away in Christ." - 2 Corinthians 3:14 (New King James Version (NKJV))

### Reflection Question

What distractions or relationships in your life might be acting as a veil, keeping you from seeing God and His vision for you clearly?

### Quote

"The only thing worse than being blind is having sight with no vision."

### Prayer

Father, reveal anything in my life that is blocking my view of You. I turn my heart fully toward You today, trusting that You will remove every veil. Amen.

# Day 3: God Gives You More Than You Can Handle Alone

## Devotional

If God gives you a vision you can accomplish on your own, it probably did not come from God. That might sound surprising, but think about it. If your talent, your connections, and your hard work are enough to get it done, where does faith come in? Where does God get the glory?

God is intentional about giving visions that require dependence on Him. Not because He wants you to struggle, but because He wants to be involved. He wants to show up in your life in ways that cannot be explained by your resume or your skill set. He wants people to look at what He has done through you and know that only He could have done it.

This means the size of the challenge in front of you is not a reason to retreat. It is a reason to lean in. When something feels too big, that is often a sign you are exactly where God wants you to be. He is not asking you to figure it out alone. He is asking you to trust Him enough to take the next step.

You have been given the Holy Spirit. That is not a small thing. The same Spirit that raised Jesus from the dead lives inside of you. Whatever God has called you to, He has already equipped you for it. The question is whether you will trust Him enough to move forward, even when it feels impossible.

## Bible Verse

"Now the Lord is the Spirit; and where the Spirit of the Lord is, there is liberty." - 2 Corinthians 3:17  
(New King James Version (NKJV))

## Reflection Question

Is there a God-given dream or calling you have been avoiding because it feels too big or too difficult for you to accomplish on your own?

## Quote

"God always gives you something beyond what you're able to do. Don't run from it. Run to it. If it's hard, say, thank you, Jesus."

## Prayer

God, give me the courage to embrace what You have called me to, even when it feels beyond my ability. Remind me that Your Spirit in me is greater than any challenge before me. Amen.

# Day 4: Freedom Is Already Inside You

## Devotional

Liberty is not something you are waiting to receive. If you have given your life to Jesus Christ, the Spirit of the Lord already lives inside of you. And where the Spirit of the Lord is, there is liberty. That means freedom is not out there somewhere. It is already within you.

This changes how you approach the things that try to hold you down. Addiction does not get the final word. Fear does not get the final word. Old habits, old shame, and old patterns do not get the final word. Because the Spirit of God has taken up residence in your life, and He does not share space with bondage.

You have the authority, through Christ, to declare that your life is free. Not because of your willpower. Not because you have it all together. But because of whose you are. You were purchased with a price. God loves you above measure. That is not just a nice thought. It is the foundation of how you live.

When you understand your identity in Christ, you stop letting things own you that were never meant to. You stop tolerating what God has already defeated. You start walking in the freedom that was bought for you at the cross. Today, remind yourself of who lives inside of you. Then live like it.

## Bible Verse

"Now the Lord is the Spirit; and where the Spirit of the Lord is, there is liberty." - 2 Corinthians 3:17  
(New King James Version (NKJV))

## Reflection Question

Are you living as though freedom is something you still need to earn, or are you walking in the liberty that Christ has already secured for you?

## Quote

"I can't be bound to alcohol. I can't be bound to drugs. I can't be bound to pornography. I can't be bound to fornication. Why? Because the Spirit is dwelling on the inside of me."

## Prayer

Lord, help me to walk in the freedom You have already given me. Where I have allowed bondage to linger, I declare today that this house is free because Your Spirit lives in me. Amen.

## Day 5: Live It Out Loud

### Devotional

When the veil is lifted and you begin to walk in the freedom and vision God has given you, something changes. You stop being quiet about it. Not because you are trying to impress anyone, but because you genuinely cannot help it. When you know what God has done for you, it comes out.

Paul writes in 2 Corinthians 3:12 that because we have this hope, we use great boldness of speech. That boldness is not arrogance. It is the natural overflow of a life that has been transformed. You do not have to manufacture it. You just have to stop suppressing it.

Sharing what God has done in your life is not just good for you. It gives other people permission to speak about what He has done in theirs. When you say it out loud, you create space for someone else to stop being ashamed of their own story. Your testimony is not just yours. It is a gift to everyone around you.

God is not asking you to be a preacher on every street corner. He is asking you to stop being ashamed of what He has done. Talk about Him naturally, the way you talk about anything else you love. Let your life be the evidence. Let your freedom be the invitation. As you learn to live openly in what God has given you, He will richly reward that faithfulness in ways you cannot yet imagine.

### Bible Verse

"Therefore, since we have such hope, we use great boldness of speech." - 2 Corinthians 3:12 (New King James Version (NKJV))

### Reflection Question

Is there someone in your life right now who needs to hear what God has done for you, and what is holding you back from telling them?

### Quote

"Not being ashamed of what God has done and is doing in your life gives God glory. When you say it out loud, you give other people permission to speak it. You free other people."

### Prayer

Father, give me boldness to speak openly about what You have done in my life. Let my story bring freedom to someone else who needs to hear it today. Amen.
